NEH INVITES NOMINATIONS FOR 1983 SUMMER STIPENDS

The National Endowment for the Humanities has invited the University to nominate three faculty and staff for 1983 Summer Stipends. The stipends will enable persons working in the humanities to pursue two consecutive months of full-time study or research.

The work proposed may be within the applicants' special field of study or in another area that will enable them to better understand their particular field and increase their competence.

Persons who wish to be nominated for a NEH Summer Stipend should submit their research or study proposals to the Office of Research Development, 104 Snow, by Sept. 1, 1982. A University committee will review the proposals and select three faculty or staff to be nominated to NEH.

The University will match the \$2,700 award from NEH with \$1,300 to bring the stipend to \$4,000.

WEMU-FM WINS PUBLIC BROADCASTING AWARD

WEMU-FM was one of 11 public radio stations honored by the Corporation for Public Broadcasting at ceremonies held recently in Cincinnati, Ohio.

The station was cited by the Corporation for Public Broadcasting for excellence in fund raising in the small market category because of its successful campaign to raise a minimum of \$25,000 in response to dramatic reductions in University funding. At the end of a ten-day campaign, the station had raised more than \$48,000, a 479 percent increase in support from the previous year.

In addition to WEMU-FM, ten other public radio stations were recognized for outstanding achievements in local public awareness, public participation and fund raising.

Entries were judged according to station market size and selected on the basis of quality of planning, print, audio and visual materials and effective use of funds.

The deadline for the July 27 issue of Faculty Staff News is 5 p.m. July 21.

Other stations receiving citations included WAMU-FM in Washington, D.C.; KUAT-AM/FM in Tucson, Ariz.; WJSU-FM in Jackson, Miss.; KCSN-FM in Northridge, Calif.; KCND-FM in Bismarck, N.D.; WGUC-FM in Cincinnati; Wisconsin Public Radio in Madison, Wis.; WUNC-FM in Chapel Hill, N.C.; Minnesota Public Radio in St. Paul, Minn.; and WNYC-FM in New York City.

Lawrence L. Freeman, professor of art, was recently appointed Dayton-Hudson Distinguished Visiting Artist-Teacher at Carleton College in Northfield, Minn.

The Dayton-Hudson Distinguished Visiting Artist-Teacher position is a part-time two-term appointment beginning January 1983.

In addition to teaching one course in advanced drawing each term, Freeman will work with a few independent study students. He will also be given the opportunity to continue his own artistic pursuits and feature a solo exhibit in the college gallery during the tenure of his position.
