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Fulbright Program Seeks Applicants

Opportunities to teach and to attend seminars abroad are available through the Fulbright Teacher Exchange Program of the U.S. Department of Education for 1982-83.

Elementary and secondary school teachers, college instructors and assistant professors are eligible to participate in the academic year abroad teacher exchange program. Exchanges are currently conducted with the United Kingdom, Germany, France, Switzerland, Denmark, Canada and New Zealand. Basic requirements are: U.S. citizenship, a bachelor's degree, and three years of teaching experience for one-year positions. Since most of the positions are on an interchange basis, applicants must be currently employed.

Seminars also will be held in 1982. Those eligible to apply include teachers of the classics, German, Italian, and world, Asian or Middle Eastern history and area studies, social studies supervisors, curriculum directors, teacher educators, and school administrators responsible for curriculum development. Basic requirements are: U.S. citizenship, a bachelor's degree and two years of teaching experience.

Applications are due between Sept. 1 and Nov. 1, 1981. All programs are subject to the availability of congressional appropriations.

Undergraduates Complete Research

Six EMU undergraduate students recently completed research projects in the Chemistry Department funded by the National Science Foundation.

Coordinated by Dr. Elva Mae Nicholson, an associate professor in the department, the undergraduate research program gave selected students the opportunity to work on a research project of their choice for a period of ten weeks, under the direction of an EMU faculty member in the Chemistry Department. Faculty members volunteered to serve as student advisors for these research

projects.

During the 10 week period, students worked a minimum of 40 hours per week with no concurrent employment. Each student received a stipend of \$1,200 for participation in the project and a housing subsidy of \$200 from EMU or tuition costs of three undergraduate credit hours.

Students were selected for the research grant on the basis of their transcripts, an application that included a statement of their long range professional goals and two letters of recommendation.

EMU Professor, Student Win Awards

Dr. William J. Cline, a professor of Spanish and bilingual studies, and Maria Rosa McCabe, a recent EMU graduate, were honored by Michigan's Office of Hispanic Education at ceremonies held recently in Lansing.

Cline was honored as the "Non-Hispanic Educator of the Year" while McCabe was selected as the "Outstanding Hispanic College Graduate."

Cline's award is presented each year to one non-Hispanic educator who has demonstrated special commitment and dedication to the educational advancement of Michigan's Hispanic population.

McCabe's award is given to a Hispanic college graduate who has excelled academically and in extracurricular activities while completing a college degree.

Cline, who has taught at EMU since 1970, earned his doctorate from the State University of New York at Buffalo in 1972. An active supporter of bilingual education, Cline was instrumental in establishing Eastern's bilingual teacher education programs and has served as director of the programs. Also, he is a past chairman of the Bilingual Education Advisory Council to the State of Michigan Board of Education.

McCabe, who currently serves as a bilingual teacher in Detroit, graduated from EMU in December 1980. A native of Barcelona, Spain, McCabe began working with bilingual children in 1971 when she taught Spanish-speaking children in Dekalb, Ill. While a student at EMU, McCabe served as a Writing Academy tutor in the University's Adult Literacy Program and taught catechism to Spanish-speaking children at St. Francis of Assisi Catholic Church.

At Eastern, McCabe was selected to the

Dean's List. She was a member of the EMU Stoic Society and Phi Kappa Phi, a national honorary society. She graduated from EMU magna cum laude with a 3.73 grade point average (out of a possible 4.0).

Cline and McCabe were selected for their awards according to criteria established by the La Raza Advisory Council to the State Board of Education.

Both recipients were presented special commemorative plaques at the awards ceremony.

Summer Course Uses Newspaper as Text

"Using the Newspaper in the Classroom," a special topics course designed especially for public school teachers, will be offered at EMU Monday through Friday, Aug. 10 through 21, in the air-conditioned Alumni Lounge of McKenny Union.

The course is designed to provide teachers with techniques for using the newspaper as a "living textbook" that will enable them to bridge the gap between their classrooms and the real world.

Participants will design a unit of study for use in their fall classrooms. Course materials include all teaching assignments: language skills, reading, writing, mathematics, social studies, consumerism, science and the arts. In addition, The Detroit News, which participates in the program under the auspices of the American Newspapers Publishers Association, will sponsor two field trips.

Faculty Member Publishes Article

Dr. Robert G. Kraft, a faculty member at Eastern, will have his article "Bike Riding and the Art of Learning" published in the forthcoming publication of the division of research at the Harvard University Business School.

The article first appeared in the June/July 1978 issue of "Change Magazine." Harvard University will include it in the spring publication of "Teaching by the Case Method, Cases on Discussion Leadership: Attitudes, Skills and Knowledge."

In the article, Kraft, a professor of American literature in the Department of English Language and Literature, equates experiences in learning to ride a bicycle with evolving a humanistic teaching method in the classroom. The article won the first national Accent on Developing Abstract Processes of Thought Award in 1978. ADAPT is a program for college freshmen administered by the University of Nebraska and supported by the Exxon Education Foundation.
