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THREE FROM FACULTY HOLD OFFICES IN NATIONAL ASSOCIATION

Dr. Alvin E. Rudisill, dean of the College of Technology, was elected president of the National Association of Industrial Technology at the association's annual meeting held recently in Richmond, Ky.

In addition, two other faculty members in the EMU college were elected or appointed to positions in the organization. Dr. Jeffrey T. Luftig, head of the Department of Industrial Technology, was appointed executive director of NAIT and Dr. Clois Kicklighter, a professor of industrial technology, was elected a regional director.

The NAIT serves as the accreditation agency for baccalaureate industrial technology programs at colleges and universities throughout the U.S. Approximately 150 schools have programs and the majority of them hold membership in NAIT.

COMPREHENSIVE PROGRAM DEADLINE EXTENDED

The Fund for the Improvement of Post-secondary Education (FIPSE) has extended the deadline for receipt of preliminary proposals for its Comprehensive Program from Dec. 1 to Dec. 14, 1981.
