DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI RECEIVE AWARDS AT HOMECOMING CEREMONIES

Three EMU alumni received 1981 Distinguished Alumni Awards at Homecoming ceremonies held last weekend.

The awards were presented at a special Homecoming luncheon held in McKenny Union.

The recipients and their awards are Dr. Donald M. Currie (1947), Distinguished Alumnus Award; Joseph Sobran (1969), Alumni Honors Award; and Dr. Michael Boulus (1974 and 1975), Outstanding Alumnus Award.

Currie is executive director emeritus of the Michigan Association of School Administrators, having served as the executive director from 1973 to 1979. Currie began his professional career as a teacher in a one room schoolhouse in Washtenaw County and has served as a teacher and administrator of public schools in industry and at the collegiate level.

Sobran is best known for his syndicated columns for The Los Angeles Times carried in more than 70 publications throughout the nation. He is the senior editor at The National Review and is a commentator on CBS Radio's "Spectrum" program. Sobran currently is writing a biography of William F. Buckley.

Boulus is deputy executive director of the Michigan Association of School Administrators and has served in that capacity since 1979. Also, he has served as director of legislative affairs for the Middle Cities Education Association and as a professor at Michigan State University.
