

Culture and Politics Highlight Series

The University's 1981-82 Guest Artist and Speaker Series will bring culture and politics to campus with events ranging from Puccini's opera "Madame Butterfly" to a special lecture by former White House Chief of Staff Hamilton Jordan.

The 1981-82 season will begin Sept. 18 and 19 with a production of Ntozake Shange's Broadway tribute to American black women "For Colored Girls Who Have Considered Suicide When the Rainbow is Enuf." Featuring a splendid cast, innovative sets, beautiful choreography and an original musical score, this production played to packed houses, standing ovations and rave reviews in Ann Arbor last spring.

Oct. 10, the legendary Count Basie and his orchestra will perform in an explosive night of jazz. Music lovers of all ages will treasure this rare opportunity to hear the incomparable Count in a special Homecoming concert.

Recognized as one of today's preeminent political strategists, Hamilton Jordan is a powerful observer of the American political scene. Scheduled to speak Oct. 14, Jordan will present an original, total perspective on the presidency and world events. Jordan's speech promises to be witty, candid and insightful.

The Campus Life series will begin the new year with another activist and observer of the American political scene, U.S. Rep. Shirley Chisholm. An articulate, straight-forward "champion of the rights of the downtrodden" and one who derives her power from the people, Chisholm will share her perspectives on politics in the U. S. Thursday, Feb. 18.

Sunday, March 13, "Madame Butterfly," a fully-staged opera by Giacomo Puccini, will be presented for the first time at EMU. Performed in English, with a full orchestra and chorus, it is the perfect introduction to the glorious world of opera.

A modern dance performance by the Alvin Ailey Repertory Ensemble scheduled for Monday, March 29, will be the season's finale. The Alvin Ailey Repertory Ensemble is a touring component of the American Dance Center, the official school of the Alvin Ailey Dance Theater. Past performances of the company have met with unanimous critical acclaim.

41 Faculty Members Promoted

Fulbright Program Deadline Near

The 1982-83 competition for grants for graduate study abroad offered under the Fulbright Program and by foreign governments, universities and private donors will close Oct. 31. Only a few more weeks remain in which qualified graduate students may apply for one of the approximately 500 awards which are available to 50 countries.

Most of the grants offered provide round-trip transportation, tuition and maintenance for one academic year; a few provide international travel only or a stipend intended as a partial grant-in-aid.

Applicants must be U.S. citizens at the time of application, and must generally hold a bachelor's degree or its equivalent before the beginning date of the grant and, in most cases, should be proficient in the language of the host country. Except for certain specific awards, candidates may not hold the Ph.D. at the time of application. Candidates for 1981-83 are ineligible for a grant to a country if they have been doing graduate work or conducting research in that country for six months or more during the academic year 1981-82.

Creative and performing artists are not required to have a bachelor's degree, but they must have four years of professional study or equivalent experience. Social work applicants must have a least two years of professional experience after the Master of Social Work degree; candidates in medicine must have an M.D. at the time of application.
