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TUITION RATE INCREASES APPROVED BY REGENTS

The Board of Regents approved an average yearly undergraduate tuition increase of only \$131.75 at its regular monthly meeting April 21.

The tuition increases at all levels, which range from eight to 11 percent, will be effective with the fall 1982 semester. Tuition for undergraduate students who are residents of Michigan or Ohio will be raised to \$41.75 per credit hour, an increase of \$4.25 per credit hour. Nonresident undergraduate students will pay \$102 per credit hour, an increase of \$9 per credit hour or 10 percent.

Tuition for graduate students who are residents of Michigan or Ohio will increase to \$57.50 per credit hour, up \$5 per credit hour or 10 percent. Nonresident graduate students will pay \$135 per credit hour, an increase of \$10 per credit hour or eight percent.

Based on estimates or approved tuition rates at the 15 state colleges and universities, Eastern Michigan tuition and fee costs per year will continue to rank in the lower third during 1982-83. Eastern ranked 11th during 1981-82.

EMU's yearly cost of \$1,365.25 for 1982-83 reflects a 10.7 percent increase over the 1981-82 yearly cost of \$1,233.50.

ROOM AND BOARD, APARTMENT RENTAL INCREASES APPROVED

The Board of Regents approved increases in room and board rates for residence halls and apartment rental rates for single students and family housing at its regular monthly meeting April 21.

The increases, which are effective July 1 for apartments and beginning with the fall semester for residence halls, average 12.4 percent or \$250 for room and board fees and 9.8 percent for apartment rents.

The increases in room and board and apartment rental rates will fund increased costs for utilities contract services, and benefits for employees as well as a reserve for badly needed maintenance which has been delayed during the past several years.

NOMINATIONS SOLICITED FOR NEH SUMMER STIPENDS

The National Endowment for the Humanities has invited the University to nominate up to three faculty and staff for 1983 Summer Stipends. The stipends will enable persons working in the humanities to pursue two consecutive months of full-time study or research. The work proposed may be within the applicants' special field of study or it may be in some other field that will enable them to understand their own fields better and enlarge their competence.

Persons who wish to be nominated for a NEH Summer Stipend should submit their research/study proposals to the Office of Research Development, 104 Snow, by Sept. 1, 1982. A University committee will review the proposals and will select the three faculty or staff to be nominated to NEH.
