## PRIVATE SUPPORT TO EMU INCREASES BY \$223,977 IN 1981

The development effort at Eastern Michigan University surpassed all expectations in 1981 by increasing private support to EMU by more than \$223,977 to an all-time high of \$677,985.

Cash gifts totaled \$412,073 for the year while bequests totaled \$20,061 and gifts-in-kind \$245,849. This represents a 49 percent increase in total annual giving over 1980. The cash gifts in December totaled \$140,850, by far the best month ever recorded by the University. In comparison, the University received \$88,833 in December 1980 and \$104,847 in December 1979.

The number of donors also increased to an all-time high of 6,742, an increase of 1,266 over 1980 and of 1,045 over the previous record number of donors of 5,697 set in 1979. Development officials said they felt this increase was particularly significant considering the current state of the economy.

University Development Director Greg Koroch said he felt the outstanding record of annual giving was due in part to the fact that the University had a more compelling case for support this year than in any year since the development effort began.

"It has been widely publicized," Koroch said, "that state support for higher education has been reduced and that private support is needed to make up the difference."
