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HUMANITARIAN WEEK ACTIVITIES PLANNED JAN. 14-17

A visit by Pulitzer prize-winning poet Gwendolyn Brooks and a musical performance by the Up With People ensemble will highlight events scheduled as part of Humanitarian Days Jan. 14 through 17.

Humanitarian Days on campus are sponsored by Student Government and the Office of Campus Life.

Brooks, poet laureate of Illinois and winner of the Shelley Memorial Award by the Poetry Society of America, will lecture and read a selection of her works Friday, Jan. 15 at 8 p.m. in Pease Auditorium. The poetry reading is free.

Saturday, Jan. 16 she will conduct a free writer's workshop for creative writing students at 1 p.m. in the Walton-Putnam Lounge. Students are encouraged to bring samples of their work.

Brooks has written numerous books of poems in addition to editing several anthologies. She is the recipient of more than 40 honorary doctorates and is often called upon to judge poetry contests and writing competitions.

The Ypsilanti Chamber of Commerce will sponsor a performance of the Up With People ensemble Thursday, Jan. 14 in Pease Auditorium. Up With People is an independent, non-profit educational and cultural group which uses entertainment to bridge the communication gap among peoples, cultures and countries.

Up With People will present a two-hour, family-oriented musical production featuring original compositions, a medley of hit tunes and a collection of folk songs and dances from throughout the world. Tickets for the performance are \$3 for adults and \$1 for children.

Tickets are available at the Ypsilanti Chamber of Commerce and the Office of Campus Life. Proceeds from the concert will go to the Ypsilanti Yesteryear Heritage Festival.

Other Humanitarian Days activities include a blood drive sponsored by the ROTC Cadet Battalion Jan. 14 and 15. Jan. 14 the drive will be held in Downing Hall from

2 to 8 p.m. and Jan. 15 it will be in the Ballroom of McKenny Union from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. The goal of the battalion is to collect 300 units of blood from members of the EMU community.

A Humanitarian Walk will be held at 5 p.m. Jan. 14 in commemoration of the birthday of Rev. Martin Luther King. The walk will begin at McKenny Union--songsheets and candles will be provided--and end at Pease Auditorium for the Up With People concert. The group will break for hot chocolate along the route.

Jan. 14 at 8 p.m. CLC Cinema will show "Judgement at Nuremburg" in Strong Auditorium. Friday and Saturday, Jan. 15 and 16, CLC Cinema will present "Brubaker" in Strong Auditorium at 8 p.m. Admission to both films is \$2.

Friday, Jan. 15, the Department of Speech and Dramatic Arts will present a special celebration of the humanitarian spirit by University music, literature and dance students. The free performance will be held at noon in Quirk Theater.

Humanitarian Days will be capped with an ecumenical humanitarian service in Holy Trinity Chapel Sunday, Jan. 17 at 10:30 a.m. The special liturgical celebration is designed for individuals of all faiths. Music will be provided by the Holy Trinity Chorus, the St. Cyril Parish Choir and a brass quintet. Albert Wheeler, former Ann Arbor mayor, will deliver the homily.

**WOMEN IN TECHNOLOGY IS
TOPIC OF NEW COURSE**

The impact of women on our technological society and the roles of women in technology-related professions will be topics for discussion in a new course titled "Women in Technology" to be offered by the College of Technology this semester.

The course will be offered Monday and Wednesday from 11 a.m. to noon in Sill Lecture Hall 2. The course is open to undergraduate and graduate students and will be offered to interested individuals on a credit-free basis through the Division of Continuing Education. The registration fee is \$75.

Some of the questions to be addressed in course lectures include: Can women reshape technological society? Can women affect the corporate ethos? What problems do women face in technology-related professions? What strategies can women use to succeed professionally in a technological society? What do women most need to know about technology and society? How does the post-industrial future coincide with feminine values?

Numerous guest lecturers will attend class sessions to discuss their individual specialties.
