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ISSUES IN CHURCH/SCHOOL RELATIONS IS WORKSHOP TOPIC

Creationism and evolution, prayer in public schools and state financing of non-public schools' educational services will be among topics for discussion in a conference titled "Issues in Church/School Relations" to be held Feb. 12 from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. in McKenny Union.

The conference is sponsored by the Center for Education and Law and the Division of Continuing Education. It is designed especially for school administrators, teacher organization leaders, church and religious leaders, parents and attorneys practicing educational law.

The purpose of the conference is to examine the significant legal developments in church/state relations and to bring together experts to discuss the legal issues.

Faculty for the conference includes:

--Dr. Martha McCarthy, a professor of education at Indiana University and author of "Public School Law: Teachers' and Students' Rights." McCarthy is a well-known speaker and is a member of the board of directors of the National Organization on Legal Problems of Education.

--Burton R. Shifman, past president of NOLPE and a Michigan attorney who has presented numerous lectures and seminars at educational law conferences.

--Dr. Jack Watters, president of the Michigan Association of Christian Schools and pastor of the Faith Baptist Church in Davison.

--And Stuart D. Hubbell, attorney for the Michigan Association of Non-Public Schools and an expert on church/state litigation in Michigan.

The conference will begin at 8 a.m. and continue through 3 p.m. Registration is \$45 per person.

SPORTS VIOLENCE IS TOPIC OF UPCOMING LECTURE

Darryl Stingley, former wide receiver for the New England Patriots, was running a slant-in pattern against the Oakland Raiders when Jack Tatum leveled him with what Tatum said was "a calculated intimidating hit."

Today, Stingley sits in a wheelchair paralyzed as a result of a broken neck sustained in that football game.

Excessive physical force in sports will be the topic of a lecture given by Richard Horrow, a Harvard Law School graduate and author of the Sports Violence Act of 1980, Thursday, Jan. 21 at 8 p.m. in Roosevelt Auditorium.

Horrow's bill, which was introduced by U.S. Rep. Ronald M. Mottl of Ohio, is designed to deter and punish episodes of excessive violence through criminal penalties.

Horrow feels that excessive violence is increasingly characterizing professional sports. His bill calls for a \$5,000 fine and one year in prison for a professional athlete who "knowingly uses excessive force and thereby causes risk of significant bodily injury to another person."

Horrow wrote his bill after studying such sports attacks as the Kermit Washington-Rudy Tomjanovich case in basketball, the Boobie Clark-Dale Hackbart case in football, the Juan Marichal-John Roseboro fracas in baseball and the Dave Forbes-Henry Boucha fight in hockey.

Horrow is the author of a book titled "Violence in Sports" and is chairman of the American Bar Association's task force on sports violence.
