FACULTY MEMBERS TO LECTURE AT MICHIGAN ACADEMY MEETING

Several EMU faculty members will present results of their current research interests at the 85th annual meeting of the Michigan Academy of Science, Arts and Letters to be held at Western Michigan University March 26 and 27.

At the meeting, the Michigan Academy will provide a forum for speakers in 30 sections, including, for the first time, sections in cinema studies and nursing.

Five faculty members from the Department of Speech and Dramatic Arts will participate in the communications section. Professor Henry Aldridge will discuss "Moving Picture Distribution in Detroit: 1920-1928," Associate Professor Gary Evans will discuss "Establishing Communication Goals and Objectives: A Model and Perspective," Assistant Professor Louis Saalbach will discuss "A Critic's View of the Federal Communications Commission," and Professor Thomas Murray and Associate Dean George McCloud will discuss "The Application of Selected Communication Model Theories to the Problems Inherent in Technology Transfer." McCloud and Saalbach will serve as chairpersons for the section.

In the education section, Barbara Mirel, a lecturer in the English Department, will discuss "American Fantasy for Children: New Worlds of Education."

Four faculty members in the Department of Geography and Geology will participate in the geography section. Professor Eugene Jaworski will discuss "A Geographic Information System for Land Use Planners," Professor James McDonald will discuss "The Geography of Nuclear Energy in France," and Professors Elwood Kureth and Carl Ojala will discuss "Electricity Transmission in Michigan's Central Upper Peninsula: Problems and Prospects." Jaworski is vice chairperson of the section.

In the history section, Associate Professor William Briggs will discuss "Chamberlain at Rome, January 1939: The Apex of Appeasement?"

In the library science section, Clare Beck, government documents librarian at EMU, will discuss "Communication and Participation: Experience with Two Mechanisms."

In the medical sciences section, Associate Professor Glen Walker of the Biology Department will discuss "Effect of Galactosemia and Aldose Reductase Inhibition on Retinal Capillary Basement Membrane Width."

In the nursing section, Leola Hogan, an assistant professor in the Department of Nursing Education, will discuss "Study of Nurses' Knowledge of Drug Interaction: Implications for Programming."

In the sociology section, Ira Wasserman, associate professor in the Sociology Department, will discuss "Inequality in Female Labor Force Participation."

In the zoology section, Howard Booth, associate professor and graduate coordinator in the Biology Department, will team with three EMU graduate students. Booth and Mary Cronin will discuss "Effects of Chrysotile Asbestos Ingestion on Mortality and Midgut Epithelia of *Tenebrio Molitor*." Booth and Dale Walters will discuss "Localization of Isotopically Labeled Polychlorinated Biphenyls in Selected Tissues of the Crayfish." And Booth and James Bowker will discuss "Bioaccumulation of Isotopically Labeled Polychlorinated Biphenyls in the Green Side of the Darter."

The 1983 annual meeting of the Michigan Academy of Science, Arts and Letters will be held at EMU on a date yet to be announced.

COMPUTER OPERATIONS MANAGER DIES MARCH 9

Robert D. Keith, manager of operations services in the University's Computing Center, died Tuesday, March 9, at his Ann Arbor home following an extended illness. He was 51.

Keith had been on sick leave since September 1981.

Keith joined the staff at Eastern in April 1974 as coordinator of information systems, a position he held until 1978 when he was promoted to manager of operations services.

Prior to his EMU appointment, Keith worked for the Bendix Corp. in Southfield from 1959 to 1974.
