EMU'S COLLEGE OF BUSINESS RECEIVES FULL ACCREDITATION

The College of Business has received notification that its master's degree programs have been fully accredited by the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business in St. Louis, Mo.

Undergraduate programs in the College of Business were approved for accreditation in 1974. With the approval of accreditation at the master's degree level, EMU became only the sixth business school in Michigan to earn approval at both levels.

"The major reason we seek accreditation is to affiliate with an organization outside the institution that is responsible for evaluating our programs for quality...We need this outside evaluation to keep us constantly motivated to more effectively prepare our students for careers in business," Dr. Joe Kent Kerby, dean of the College of Business, stated.

Kerby added that the AACSB has 643 academic members and that 231 of the schools are accredited for at least one level. Only 180 or 28 percent of the schools with membership in the AACSB are accredited at both the bachelor's and master's degree level.

According to AACSB estimates, there are approximately 1,200 college and university business schools throughout the U.S. Just 19 percent of those institutions are accredited with only 15 percent accredited at both levels.

FORD MOTOR CO. EXECUTIVE TO SPEAK ON CAMPUS

Dr. Nancy Badore, employee involvement coordinator of Diversified Products Operations at Ford Motor Co., will speak on employee involvement and quality of work life programs, Tuesday, May 18, at 6:30 p.m. in Room 219 of the Pray-Harrold Classroom Building.

The event is part of the speakers' bureau program sponsored by the Master of Science in Organizational Development Program.

Employee involvement programs encourage the participation of employees in company decision making. The Ford program uses small group decision-making techniques similar to those used in Japanese automobile companies.

Topics Badore will address include em-

ployee involvement for salaried and professional workers, the effects of employee involvement on collective bargaining employees, and the role of the organizational development practitioner.

NATIONAL SCIENCE FOUNDATION SEEKS SCIENCE EDUCATION PROPOSALS

The Development in Science Education Program in the National Science Foundation is encouraging proposals to develop creative, innovative prototypes of computer-based instructional material or model programs that have strong potential for generating ideas for making significant improvements in the nation's science and engineering education efforts. ENGLISH PROFESSOR AWARDED FELLOWSHIP

Dr. Nadean Bishop, associate professor of English language and literature, has been awarded a \$2,500 fellowship to attend the National Endowment for the Humanities Summer Seminar for College Teachers.

The eight-week seminar at the University of California-Berkeley will deal with the contrast between Victorian and Modern poetics. Bishop will be writing a paper on the religious imagery in the love poetry of Christina Rossetti. She expects to include this paper in the book she will write during her 1982-83 sabbatical leave from EMU.

EMU'S ALETHEA HELBIG IS ASSOCIATION PRESIDENT

Alethea K. Helbig, an assistant professor of English, has been elected president of the Children's Literature Association for 1982-83.

The association was formed to encourage serious scholarship and research in children's literature and currently has a membership of nearly 800 writers, critics, teachers, librarians and students.
