National Science Foundation, Industry Leaders and Academic Privacy Researchers: Adversaries or Partners? Jules Plonetsky, CEO, Future of Privacy Forum

As 2017 begins, are we entering a time of crisis or a time of opportunity for individual privacy? Law enforcement demands for consumer data continue to grow and surveillance by intelligence agencies continues to drive civil liberties debates. Online tracking for analytics and advertising has been extended to mobile devices, to interactive television and to smart home devices. Social media sharing has achieved near ubiquity, with services integrating location, facial recognition, and live video sharing. With connected cars, our motor vehicles become data collectors and with drones our public spaces can be more easily monitored. Big data strains

against fair information practices of consent, limited purpose and data minimization. Algorithmic decision making and machine learning wreak havoc with efforts to provide transparency. Artificial Intelligence may leave us unsure who will even be accountable for data driven determinations.

But yet, the very stress on privacy created by these advances could create opportunities for progress, if academic-industry cooperation can be focused on key issues identified in the National Privacy Research Strategy. Based on his experience working with more than 130 senior privacy officers at companies, as well as with leading academics and privacy advocates, Jules will discuss options for harnessing academic and industry efforts to advance transparency and control, de-identification, ethics, and algorithmic accountability. He will review current areas of privacy developments around student data, wearables, connected cars, microphones in the home, smart toys and smart cities. He will also examine opportunities to ensure administrative data is available to researchers in a trusted manner for evidence based policymaking.

Robert Wood Johnson, Policies for Action: Policy and Law Research to Build a Culture of Health

Policies for Action: Policy and Law Research to Build a Culture of Health (P4A) was created to help build the evidence base for policies that can help build a Culture of Health. P4A seeks to engage long-standing health care, mental and behavioral health, and public health researchers, as well as experts in areas that we recognize have strong influence on health, well-being and equity—such as labor, criminal justice, education, transportation, housing, and the built environment. The research funded under this call for proposals (CFP) should help fill significant gaps in our knowledge about what policies can serve as positive drivers of change, including

how the social determinants of health can be used to achieve improvements in population health, well-being, and equity.

Congressional Research Grants Sponsored by the Dirksen Congressional Center

The Dirksen Congressional Center invites applications for grants to fund research on congressional leadership and the U.S. Congress. The Center, named for the late Senate Minority Leader Everett M. Dirksen, is a private, nonpartisan, nonprofit research and educational organization devoted to the study of Congress. Since 1978, the Congressional Research Grants program has invested more than \$1,000,000 to support over 462 projects.

The Center has allocated up to \$30,000 in 2017 for grants with individual awards capped at \$3,500. The competition is open to individuals with a serious interest in studying Congress. Political scientists, historians, biographers, scholars of public administration or American studies, and journalists are among those eligible. The Center encourages graduate students who have successfully defended their dissertation prospectus to apply and awards a significant portion of the funds for dissertation research. Applicants must be U.S. citizens who reside in the United States.

U.S. Department of Justice, National Institute of Justice New Investigator/Early Career Program in Social and Behavioral Sciences

The NIJ New Investigator/Early Career Program provides support for non-tenured assistant professors to conduct applied research on topics relevant to NIJ in the social/behavioral and STEM sciences. Applications must propose research led by a Principal Investigator (PI) who: was awarded a terminal degree no more than four (4) years ago; holds a non-tenured assistant professor position at an accredited institution of higher education in the United States; and has not previously served as PI on an NIJ research grant or fellowship.

National Science Foundation Dear Colleague Letter: Public Participation in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics Research: Capacity-building, community-building, and direction-setting

With this Dear Colleague Letter (DCL), the National Science Foundation's (NSF) Directorates for Computer and Information Science and Engineering (CISE), Education and Human Resources (EHR), Geosciences (GEO), Social, Behavioral, and Economic Sciences (SBE), Engineering (ENG), Mathematics and Physical Sciences (MPS) (Divisions of Physics and Materials Research, only) and the Office of International Science and Engineering (OISE) announce their intention to support proposals aimed at capacity-building, community-building, and direction-setting for Public Participation in STEM Research (PPSR), in alignment with the Foundation's PPSR Agency Priority Goal for fiscal years (FY) 2016-2017. In PPSR, members of the public partner with scientists and engineers to solve complex problems through participating in some or all of the formulation of questions and experiments; collection and analysis of data; and interpretation, use, and publication of results. Encompassing citizen science, citizen sensing, crowdsourcing, community science, and related approaches, PPSR also benefits public participants by providing opportunities to learn, addressing questions of concern to the participants and their communities, and contributing to science and engineering.
