I am unable to attend this but as promised here is my brief paragraph about the mediation on

I co-mediated with another woman whom I had worked with once before. An African-American man observed. I am African-American and the other woman is White. We both have MSW degrees and had had a previous luncheon coordinated by Sally during which we discussed our personal backgrounds and take on racial issues. I believe that this led to a signiifcant degree of comfort and trust when were presented with a case involving a property dispute between a young African-American woman and a middle-aged White woman. The issues on the small claims case compliant made by the African-American woman were trespassing and distruction of property.

After opening the session I asked the two parties to take turns describing the issue from their own perspectives. Fortunately, my co-mediator made sure that we also read the appropriate warnings regarding confidentiality, etc. and asked the two to sign a waiver agreeing to mediation; she also pointed out that the two were both Christian women. They agreed. This was done very smoothly. We then proceeded to hear from the two parities.

It was very difficult to understand the issues as presented verbally so my co-mediator and I asked the parties to draw a diagram of the property and the areas in dispute. Once this was drawn, it became more apparent what the nature of the dispute was. We (mediators out loud) then read the property descriptions that each had brought (when they read them, they tended to obscure the pertinent details.)

The plantiff made a comment that she really did not mind the respondents grandchildren (oveer 17 in number) on her property but did mind when she woke up and saw some "scary large white men on her property." The respondent took umbrage at this.

At this point I related a story about my own family and an old friend who was afraid of my son and husband (also AA) when she saw them approaching in the dark. I stated, "As a woman she was afraid of large males." The complianant then stated that she was afraid (even though she is a veteran of the Iraq war) because she had never met the neighbors and was frequently not home due to the fact that she is a touring opera singer.

The respondent mentioned that she had not met the plaintiff because she had moved into the area while the plaintiff was away helping her mother who subsequently died. At this time my co-mediator and I suggested that perhaps the two should meet and they began making plans to do so. It appeared that they were relieved to find that each wanted better relationships. My co-mediatior praised them for this.

We further agreed to a means to resolve an issue of a fence/hedge and joint use of the access route.

These agreements were put in writing and the two left while discussing plans for a cookout or other social occasion.

Sally debriefed all three from DRC.

Hello Sally,

I meant to share with you on numerous occasions about the mediation that I watched.

There were co-mediators in that situation and there was a property dispute. One person was very challenging and deceptive while the plaintiff was trying to be accommodating. There clearly were underlying issues related to trust entitlement and race that made it difficult for them communicate.

The mediators did an outstanding job of complementing each other, being patient and polite while listening carefully to what was said. the fact that they were different and had different backgrounds helped in their complementing each other and allowed them to gather needed information and interject in a way that brought out more accurate information, but just as important the barriers to communication were broken down and the process moved forward speedily to an acceptable agreement for both. Afterwards they even exchanged contact information to maintain contact when they had not been interacting for an extended period of time prior to the mediation. It was a pleasure to watch them work together.

It highlighted how mediators bring in "baggage" of their own which has both valuable tools as well as trash. Having two mediators who have different tools can really be a significant benefit in addressing the not so obvious, but very important issues that my be bogging down the process. This was a fantastic illustration of how that can work. Thank you very much for the opportunity to observe-
