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Administrators discuss budget process

Senior administrators met with University President John W. Porter, Vice President for Administration Carolyn Spatta and University Planning Officer George Johnston Thursday, June 11, to discuss the 1981-82 budget process. President Porter described the process that had occurred to date, what the anticipated revenues for 1981-82 were and some of the projected additions and deletions to the budget. He asked the administrators to "have faith that we are trying to do what's best for the University" and emphasized that the budget process was an attempt "to be creative, responsive, to make this University ride through the crisis, not just maintain its position."

The projected budget for 1981-82 includes an anticipated state appropriation of \$35.8 million, tuition revenue of \$16.8 million (at a 13 percent increase in tuition) and investment and other income of \$1.9 million, totaling \$54.5 million. He said an executive order from the state amounting to two percent of the budget was expected in October, reducing the projected budget to \$54 million. He noted that \$5.8 million in program improvements have been supported necessitating cuts totaling \$4 million from existing programs. Of the 100 major programs of the University, 28 are targeted for major cutbacks, including admissions, scholarships, fellowships, academic administration, nursing, faculty productivity, faculty research, sabbatical leaves, media services, library, Continuing Education, Career Planning and Placement, dean of students office, athletics, graduate records, student services administration, physical plant, utilities, maintenance, custodial services, major facility repairs, fiscal administration, mail and receiving, University Computing, salary recoupment, public services, WEMU-FM and Information Services.

Spring enrollment increases slightly

Unofficial enrollment for the spring term is 9,289 students as compared to 9,267 students during spring term 1980. The increase of 22 students is less than one percent. Enrollment includes 423 freshmen, 844 sophomores, 1,426 juniors, 2,707 seniors, 876 special students and 3,013 graduate students. Of the total, 3,865 are male and 5,424 are female. Full-time enrollment includes 132 undergraduates and 435 graduate students while part-time enrollment is 6,144 undergraduates and 2,578 graduate students. Credit hour production for the term is 38,076, a decline of less than half a percent from 1980's figure of 40,057.

Peace conference to be held on campus

The National Biennial Conference of the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom will be held on campus June 16 through 21. Ann Fagan Ginger, a writer and director of the Meiklejohn Institute for Civil Liberties in California, will be the keynote speaker and U.S. Representative George W. Crockett, Jr., of Detroit will deliver the closing address. Conference workshop topics will include "Feminism," "Racism in the 1980s," "Looking at Our Neighbor: Central America," "Call for a Nuclear Freeze," and "Prisons and the Death Penalty." He has coached at Davison High School and spent two seasons as a graduate assistant on the Purdue varsity football staff. His appointment was effective May 8.

New technology program approved for fall

A new bachelor's degree program in polymers and coatings technology was approved at the April Board of Regents meeting. The program will be offered through the College of Technology in cooperation with the Chemistry Department and will emphasize a combination of theory and hands-on, practical experience in the synthesis of polymers and the formulation of coatings and paints. The program will be offered beginning with the fall semester.
