New Swaziland chief of party appointed

Dr. Robert E. Krebs, a professor in the Department of Teacher Education, has been appointed chief of party of EMU's curriculum development project in Swaziland. Krebs replaces Dr. William Kromer, who has served as head of the Swaziland project for the past two years. Kromer will return to his duties as director of the National Center for Community Education in Flint. Krebs, who began teaching at EMU in 1968, will join Eastern's project staff in Swaziland June 22. Eastern's Swaziland project is attempting to reform the African country's primary school curriculum. The project is aiding the Swazi government in its goal of providing primary education to all Swazi children by 1985.

Faculty salary adjustments

The faculty salary adjustment story in the May 5 issue of Focus EMU incorrectly reported that the adjustments for 14 faculty members in the College of Business were approved as part of the contract negotiation last summer. Actually, the EMU Chapter of the American Association of University Professors recognized the right of the University to adjust faculty salaries based on changing market conditions. Library adds native American resource materials

The University Library is adding to its materials on native Americans. The addition is made possible by funds from Dean George P. Melican, Continuing Education. Approximately 50 titles have been added, including such basic books as Stan Hoig's "Peace Chiefs of the Cheyennes;" "Bride of the Gods, Mountains of Fire" by Chuck Williams; Carl Sauer's "17th Century North America"; five titles on the American Indian from the Indiana University Press; the "Concise Dictionary of Indian Tribes of North America" by Barbara Leitch; and Eve Ball's "Indeh, An Apache Odyssey." When complete, the collection will improve the Library's holdings in this important area.
