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## EASTERN TO ESTABLISH LONG DISTANCE PHONE NETWORK

Beginning September 1, Eastern and the Infonet Division of National Tel Data will establish a shared long distance telephone network. The new network is expected to save the University \$80,000 annually in long distance toll charges.

There will be two differences in the way long distance calls will be made. First, a number other than 9 will be dialed to access the system; second, an authorization code will be used. The authorization code will enable account executives to determine the party who made each long distance call.

In addition, long distance calls made from any telephone on campus will be billed to the home department.

EMU resident students each will receive a separate telephone bill, eliminating service shut off problems associated with more than one student on a single monthly bill.

Authorization codes will be issued during August along with detailed information about the long distance network. Individuals with specific questions should contact the Service Operations Office at 7-1299.

The shared network represents a significant step toward the purchase of Eastern's own telephone system which will provide upgraded features and more savings to the University.

## DR. ROBERT HOLKEBOER TO DIRECT NEW EMU HONORS PROGRAM

Dr. Robert O. Holkeboer, professor of English Language and Literature at Eastern, has been appointed director of the new University Honors Program.

The Honors Program was approved by the EMU Board of Regents at its June meeting. The goal of the program is to recruit, retain and reward academically gifted students at Eastern.

Holkeboer has named Dr. Gary L. Evans, associate professor of communication and theater arts, as assistant honors director.

Holkeboer joined Eastern's faculty in 1971. His bachelor's degree is from Calvin College and his master's and doctorate degrees are from Ohio University. In addition, he was a Fulbright Scholar at the Sorbonne in Paris. Holkeboer taught at Ohio University, the University of Michigan and Boston University before joining Eastern's faculty on a full-time basis.

Holkeboer has been instrumental in establishing EMU's Honors Program.

Evans has been teaching at EMU since 1964. His bachelor's degree is from Wayne State and his Ph.D. is from the University of Michigan.

An Honors Council composed of five faculty and five students has been formed to help establish the program during the summer term.

## BOARD OF REGENTS TO MEET

The EMU Board of Regents will hold its regular monthly meeting Wednesday, Aug. 3. Among the items to be discussed are the Hewitt Road extension, a revised Health Service Fee, a report on the Michigan Youth Corps, a Student Conduct Code policy revision, expansion of the Regents Scholar Program, faculty promotions, tenure and re-appointments, appointment of a new provost and vice president for academic affairs and election of a secretary to the Board.

MUSIC PROFESSOR RECEIVES ASTA COMMISSION

Dr. Anthony Iannaccone, associate professor of music, has received a \$1,000 commission from the American

String Teachers Association (ASTA).

Iannaccone will compose a new orchestra work to be premiered at Ann Arbor's Hill Auditorium Jan. 20. The composition will be performed by an Honors Orchestra at ASTA's 1984 Midwestern Conference.

Also, Iannaccone will provide consultation during rehearsals, giving young musician the opportunity to meet the composer of the work they will perform.

In addition to the ASTA commission, Iannaccone recently received a \$1,000 award from the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers (ASCAP) for serious composition.

EMU PROFESSOR NAMED DEAN OF INDIANA STATE SCHOOL OF TECHNOLOGY

Dr. Clois E. Kicklighter, professor of Industrial Technology at Eastern, has been appointed the new dean of the Indiana State University School of Technology.

Kicklighter, who has been employed by EMU since 1966, began his new job July 25. He will serve as professor of construction technology at ISU in addition to dean.

Kicklighter, 45, is the author of several books on architecture and construction, including "Architecture: Residential Drawing and Design," "Modern Masonry: Brick, Block and Stone" and, with R. Baird, "Modern Crafts." He was a founding member of the National Association of Industrial Technology, the accreditation agency for baccalaureate industrial technology programs at colleges throughout the U.S. He also is a member of the American Council on Industrial Teacher Education and the Society of Manufacturing Engineers.

### PARENT EDUCATION COURSES OFFERED AT EMU

Four courses intended for people interested in teaching, designing and implementing parent education and staff development programs will be offered at Eastern Aug. 22 through 26.

"Planning and Implementing Parent Education Programs." Dr. Bruce L. Warren, director of the Contemporary Parenting Program at Eastern, will be the instructor.

"Preventing Abuse in Family Foster Care." The instructor will be Emily Jean McFadden, associate director of the National Foster Care Education Project and assistant professor of social work at EMU.

"Fostering Discipline." Dr. Patricia Ryan, director of National Foster Care Education Project and professor of sociology at Eastern will be the instructor.
