REGENTS APPROVE APPOINTMENTS

Dr. Ronald W. Collins, associate vice president for academic affairs here, was named provost and vice president for academic affairs by the Board of Regents at its Aug. 3 meeting. Collins replaces Dr. Anthony H. Evans and has been serving as acting vice president since last fall.

Collins joined the faculty here in 1965 as an assistant professor of chemistry. He was promoted to associate professor in 1967 and full professor in 1971. He served as interim head of the Department of Chemistry from 1977 to 1978 and was named permanent head in 1979. In 1980, he was appointed associate vice president for academic affairs. Collins has been the recipient of three major awards for outstanding teaching.

Dr. Elizabeth Camp King, associate director for academic affairs for the Council on Higher Education in Frankfort, Ky., was named dean of the College of Health and Human Services by the Board of Regents. King succeeds Dr. Peter Dual.

King earned an associate's degree in clinical laboratory technology from Alfred State College, bachelor's and master's degrees in education from the State University College of New York at Buffalo and a doctorate, also in education, from Pennsylvania State University.

Dr. George E. McCloud, associate dean of the Graduate School, was appointed acting dean by the Board of Regents. He replaces Dr. Gary D. Keller.

McCloud began teaching in the Communication and Theater Arts Department in 1970. In 1980, he was appointed to prepare the University's self-study for accreditation by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. He was appointed assistant to the dean of the Graduate School in 1981 and associate dean later that year.

Roy E. Wilbanks, assistant to the president for government and community

relations, was elected secretary to the Board of Regents. The position has been filled on a temporary basis by John C. Fountain, vice president for university relations, for the past two years.

Wilbanks was appointed assistant to the president in June. He is a 1965 graduate of Colorado State University and earned his Master of Arts degree from EMU in 1968.

Dr. Michael J. Brink, director of unit coordination and corporate sponsorship manager in the External Programs Department of the GMI Engineering and Management Institute, was appointed head of the Department of Industrial Technology. He replaces Dr. Jeffrey Luftig who was appointed director of the new Technology Services Center and associate dean of the College of Technology at EMU in June. (Continued on page 2.)

OTHER BOARD ACTION

In other Board action at its Aug. 3 meeting, the Regents:

- Accepted 12 educational grants totaling \$500,166, including a new \$133,374 grant from the U.S. Department of Education for a project titled "A Bilingual Vocational Education Preservice Instructors Training Program at EMU."
- Accepted \$269,036 in gifts for the second quarter, including \$137,261 for the month of May. The largest single gift was for \$50,000 from the Herrick Foundation of Detroit for the Quirk Improvement Project.
- Approved a new Health Service Fee of \$1.25 per credit hour, effective in January, 1984.
- Approved an increase in the University's commitment to scholarships for academically talented students amounting to more than \$270,000 for the 1984-85 academic year and \$860,000 over four years.

The Board of Regents also heard a report about the University's participation in the Michigan Youth Corps program and heard University President John W. Porter announce that EMU has been awarded a \$250,000 challenge grant from The Kresge Foundation in support of its capital campaign to renovate and expand Quirk Theater

Released Time Awards Announced

Six faculty members have been selected to receive one-quarter released time appointments this Fall under the 1983-84 ORD/Graduate School Released Time Program.

The purpose of the program is to provide support to faculty as they write major departmental or interdepartmental proposals for external funding that will have a realizable impact on the educational and research mission of the University. Award recipients are selected competitively each year for the Fall and Winter Semesters.

Humanities Research Grants

The National Endowment for the Humanities has announced a special Fall competition for Research Project proposals. This program supports collaborative or coordinated research projects involving two or more scholars or individual researchers working with consultants, research assistants, clerical or technical support personnel. Projects are expected to lead to publishable products. Applications are encouraged for projects dealing with the bicentennial of the United States Constitution and confer-

ces and research projects dealing with the historical, philosophical, theoretical and social development of humanities disciplines and assessments of the discipline's current state. Studies focused on the disciplines of archaeology, art history, the history and philosophy of science and technology, international and foreign area studies, linguistics and literary theory are particularly encouraged.

SUMMER ENROLLMENT UP AT EMU

Some 2,835 undergraduates and 1,673 graduate students are enrolled here for the 1983 summer term. The total summer headcount is 4,508, an increase of 25 students from one year ago.

Enrollment by class level totals 172 freshmen, 361 sophomores, 625 juniors, 1,585 seniors, 92 special students and 1,673 graduate students. Of the total enrollment, 2,496 are females and 2,012 are males.

The enrollment figures are for the one-tenth date of the summer term, which is June 30.

The summer head count for 1982 was 4,483. Credit hour production at EMU for the summer term decreased from 19,507 academic credit hours in summer 1982 to 19,161 credit hours as of June 30 this summer.
