## REGENTS APPROVE APPOINTMENTS

The following appointments and promotions were approved by the Board of Regents at their May 18 meeting:

--Roy Wilbanks, principal of the Regional Career Technical Center in Ypsilanti, was appointed secretary to the Board of Regents and assistant to the president for governmental and community relations.

As assistant for governmental and community relations to President John W. Porter, Wilbanks will serve as the University's chief liaison officer between the University and local, state and national government agencies and legislative committees.

Wilbanks has an extensive background as an educator and administrator in the Ypsilanti Public Schools. Since 1976, he has served as principal at the Regional Career Technical Center, an area vocational center for a three district consortium. Prior to his appointment as principal, he served as assistant principal and placement director at the center.

His appointment is effective July 1.

--Dr. Paul T. McKelvey, director of off-campus credit and external degree programs at Indiana University/Purdue University at Indianapolis, was appointed dean of continuing education.

--Dr. James C. Waltz was named acting head of the History and Philosophy Department, Dr. Andrew A. Nazzaro acting head of the International Projects Office, Dr. Bruce D. ## REGENTS SUMMARY

The Board of Regents acted on the following at their May 18 meeting:

--A new labor contract with Local 1666 of AFSCME was approved.

--Educational grants totaling \$160,476 were accepted, including \$80,000 for Eastern's National Center on Teaching and Learning.

--The Regents heard a report and recommendations about computer security.

--"A New Retention Strategy," the student retention program, was approved.

--Gifts totaling \$59,664 for January through March were accepted, including a \$10,000 bequest from the estate of Ruth Beers and a \$5,000 gift from Barbara and Edward Collins.

--A \$40,000 challenge grant for WEMU-FM was approved.

--Auxiliary Fund Operating Budgets for 1983-84 were approved.

--A general fund support budget and a plan to generate an additional \$500,000 in revenue for athletics was approved.

ENROLLMENT UP FROM 1978

EMU's enrollment of FiTIACs (First Time In Any College) has made steady increases since 1978, according to the chart below, issued by Eastern's Registration Office.

The number of total new undergraduate students and total returning undergraduate students also increased during that period.

Total new FiTIACs numbered 1,873 in fall, 1978; 2,019 in 1979; 2,184 in 1980; 2,356 in 1981 and 2,512 in 1982.

Although the total student enrollment in 1982 was down 403 students from the peak of 19,148 in fall, 1981, Eastern enrolled 113 more students than in 1978.
