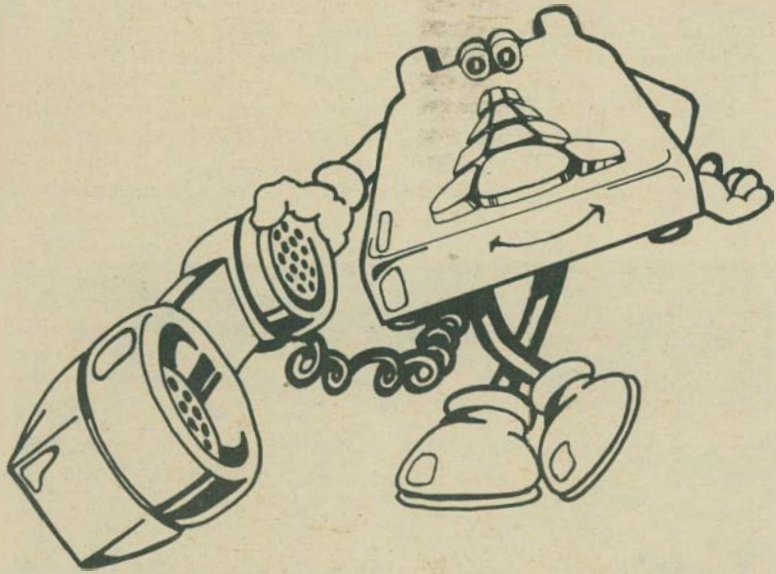

Annual Phonathon plans underway

Perhaps the sound of 35,000 telephones ringing isn't the typical harbinger of spring, but at EMU the sounds that accompany the annual student-alumni Phonathon, that reaches some 35,000 alumni, have been signaling spring's arrival since 1976.

Over the years, the phonathon has provided needed dollars for student scholarships, departmental programs, and classroom equipment purchases. It has provided funds to meet critical unbudgeted needs in various departments as well.

During the last three years an average of \$80,000 per year in alumni commitments was raised through the phonathon and this year's goal is even more ambitious. The 1984 spring Student-Alumni Phonathon, which is slated for March 11 through April 12, is expected to raise \$90,000 for the University.

To reach this goal, the Office of Development will entreat the help of alumni, staff, faculty and students. Participants from each group are needed to donate at least three and one-half hours of their time on one evening to "call for Eastern."

Heading the recruitment of

student volunteers will be the Student Foundation along with its president, Karen Rutgers. Chairing the alumni will be Normajean Anderson, president of the alumni association; Barbara Weiss, teacher in the Ypsilanti Public Schools; and George Beaudette, principal of Ypsilanti High School. And coordinating faculty and staff volunteers will be members of the Development Office staff.

Sunday, March 11 through Sunday, March 18 (excluding weekends) are designated alumni calling nights and Monday, March 19 through Thursday, April 12 (minus weekends) will be scheduled for student callers. Although no night, or nights, have been specifically designated for faculty-staff callers, the Office of Development is accepting all offers of individual or group help.

EMU's Theater presents Musical 'Threepenny opera'

EMU's Theater will open its winter season with eight nightly performances of the musical "Threepenny Opera" Friday, Feb. 10 through Sun. Feb. 12 and Tuesday, Feb. 14 through Saturday, Feb. 18 in Quirk Theater.

"Threepenny Opera," also known as "Die Dreigroschenoper," is written by Bertolt Brecht with music by Kurt Weill. Directed by EMU associate professor Kenneth W. Stevens, the play takes place in London, before and during Queen Victoria's Coronation. It revolves around London criminal "Mac the Knife" who dodges two jealous lovers, the chief of police, vengeful parents

and his own gang of ruffians, to escape the gallows on Coronation Day.

"One thing we are trying to emphasize in our production is the play's humor and quality," Stevens said. "Coming out of pre-Nazi Germany, the show has, over a period of years, become known for its social and political image."

"The show contains excellent musical numbers by Kurt Weill and placing greater emphasis on humor and music, we will present a play with more audience appeal while depicting the social-economic elements that lead to national socialism," Stevens added.

The cast for "Threepenny

Opera" includes EMU students Sue Felder of Monroe as Mrs. Peachum, Sue Gillis of Ann Arbor as Lucie, Tracy Komaray of Ann Arbor as Jenny, Mary Jo Licata of Brighton as Polly, John Lindsay of Metamora as Macheath, Mark O'Brien of Cleveland as Filch, Brian Philbin of Ypsilanti as Brown and James Vezina of Windsor as Mr. Peachum.

Curtain time at Quirk is 8 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday and 7 p.m. on Sunday. Tickets are \$4.50 for the general public and \$3 for EMU students.

Focus on Staff

England sees his dream come true

All of us have dreams. They may be about owning a luxurious house on acres of land, inhabiting a remote island in the Caribbean, or winning a fortune in the lottery. However, few of us may actually see our dreams realized.

Bob England, director of recreation and intramurals, has recently joined the ranks of the satisfied dreamers. He spent years dreaming about the ideal intramural facility for the students at EMU, and now is able to see students enjoying the Lloyd W. Olds Student Recreation Center, which he feels is the best in the country.

"Eastern's recreation/intramural building is the best because it is the newest and the emphasis, from the beginning, has been on recreation and intramurals. It actually went through the whole construction phase and still ended up being entirely for recreation," he said.

Recreation wasn't always this idyllic at Eastern. When England joined the staff 15 years ago, students were playing softball and football in the city parks. "The available time (on campus) kept being eroded. Going from what we had to a facility like this has really been something," England said.

England oversees the day-to-day operation of the student recreation center, aided by his staff and 275 student employees. "We have a lot to do because of the numbers involved. It's a two or three day jigsaw puzzle just getting our student employee schedules set up," England said.

"We go beyond most on-campus jobs, we have job descriptions for every job telling them exactly what to do and we

require a lot. We administer extra testing for the lifeguards, including written exams and testing in the water. The 12 student building supervisors have first aid, water safety and CPR training," he added.

"These kids are so responsible, we turn the building over to them and they run it without any problems," England said.

One of the initial goals of the student recreation complex was to involve students in the operation of the facility. England feels this goal has been achieved. "The students have weekly meetings about rules and make significant changes in the administration of the building. Students also serve on the screening committees for new staff selection," he said.

England says one of the best things about his job is working with so many student employees. "While my job has changed considerably over the past three years, there is still a lot of day-to-day contact with the activities, although I miss not knowing all the student employees by name."

England also enjoys the positive responses he's received to the student recreation facility and the continual increase of its use. "The real increase has been in drop-ins because the pool and the rest of the facility is open all day. We probably have more people that just swim in a day than we had totally recreating in the other building," he said.

"I think commuters get a big benefit from the building and use it a lot to fill time between classes," England said.

England, who was born and raised in Ypsilanti, has been involved in sports since he was a

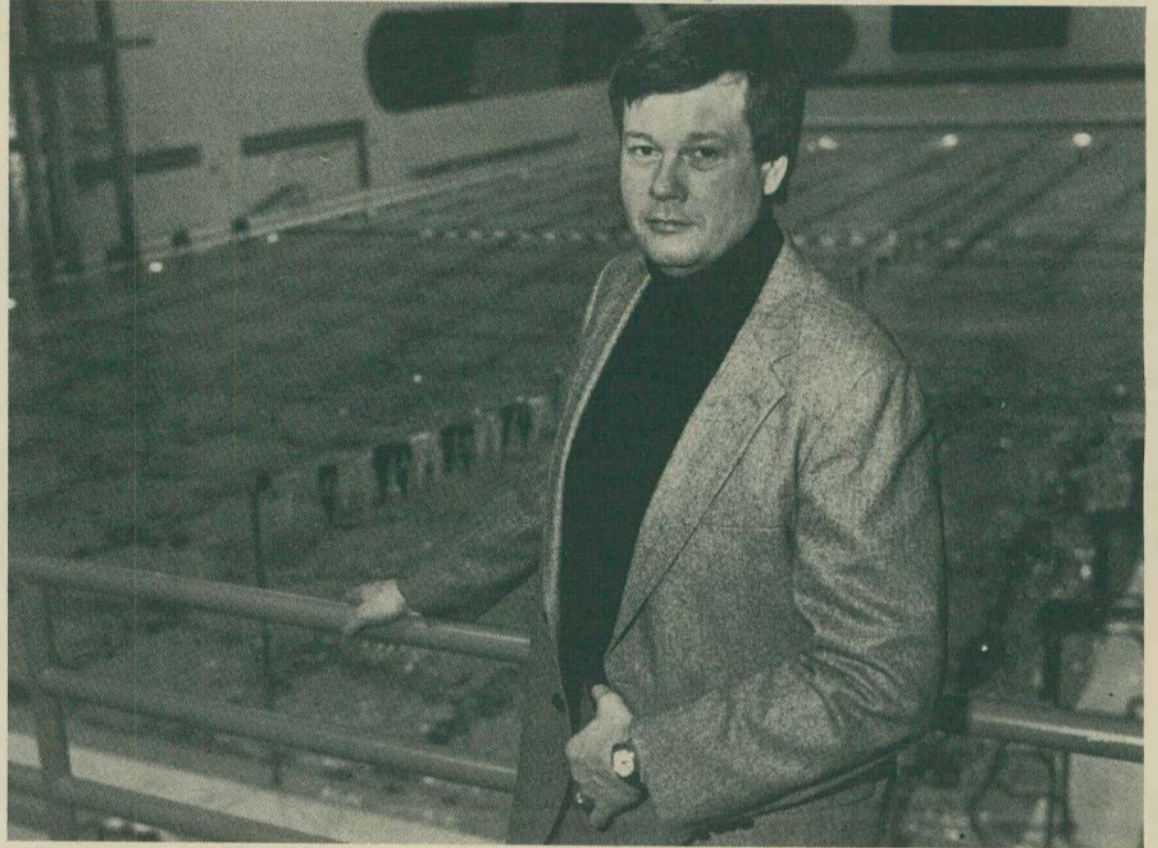
kid. He played football for the University of Michigan, earned his bachelor's and master's degrees there and worked as a graduate assistant in the U-M intramural program. "My dad used to say I would have to quit playing games and grow up and

work for a living someday. He was real surprised when he saw I was able to make a living this way," England joked.

And is he still dreaming? "Some people think I'm crazy, but I would love to see a pond area and a beach adjacent to the

student recreation complex," England said. He envisions a park-like area where students could sun, rent paddle boats and play volleyball in the sand. Who knows? Maybe this dream also will come true.

Men's track team sets world's record

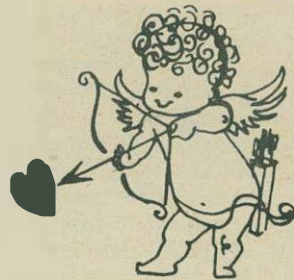
When the Eastern Michigan University men's track team headed for the Western Michigan Relays Friday (Jan. 27) it had a mission—set a world's record.

And when the smoke had cleared, the Huron spirit medley relay team had done just that, running a 3:18.7 clocking to shatter the world's record of 3:22.67 set by a Michigan State team in 1979. The MSU quartet was second in the race to the University of Michigan which ran 3:20.8, but the U-M team included runners from two countries and all of the runners on a world-record setting relay must be from the same country.

Detroit Pershing H.S., was clocked in 21.9 for his 200-meter leg and Curry, a junior from Akron, OH-Garfield H.S., ran a 21.5 200-meter split and handed off to Jones for the 800-meter anchor leg.

Jones, the outstanding sophomore from Taylor Central H.S., exploded for a 1:47.6 anchor leg to help the relay team gain the world's mark.
