Establishment of a project team charged with developing the final plans for implementation of an integrated student data/information file and on-line registration, as well as improvements in academic advising, was announced by President John W. Porter on Tuesday, Feb. 14.

The project is under the direct supervision of Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs Ronald W. Collins. He has selected Ursula Christian, director of registration, to serve as project manager. During this assignment, Joanne Michalak, coordinator in the Registration Office, will serve as acting director of registration.

The team will be responsible for analyzing and developing an implementation schedule for an integrated Student Information File, the operational merger of the Academic Records and Registration Offices, and on-line registration system and informational and organizational integration of academic advising into the new Records/Registration Office.

The integrated Student Information File will provide one unified source for the tracking and processing of students through a sequence of offices, including Admissions, Advising, Registration, Records/Graduation, and Alumni Relations. This data base will be used by these offices as the single source of information about all EMU students, past, present and future.

## Burns retires from EMU after 20 years of service

"I've always enjoyed my work. I didn't mind being kept busy," said Stephanie Burns, secretary in the dean's office of the College of Business. Burns, who retired February 17 after 20 years of service, certainly has had a busy career.

Burns joined the EMU staff in 1964 and was the first full time secretary in the Business College, which came into being that same year. She has seen the college grow. "I came in with a handful of professors and now we've got one hundred, both full and part time."

She worked and watched as the college became accredited for its undergraduate programs in 1973 after a first denial. The graduate programs were accredited in 1982. "I've always felt proud that I was part of the accreditation process."

With the process complete, students gave her a cue, which Burns said signaled her retirement. "I've seen some of the students who graduated from here go on to get their doctorates... They have come back and are teaching. That made me kind of think, gee... maybe it's time to retire."

Burns also had a busy childhood. "Mrs. League-of-All-Nations," as she calls herself, was born in Copenhagen, Denmark of Polish parents. After a childhood of speaking Danish, a seven-year-old Burns learned

English and Polish to begin her life in the U.S.

At the start of her career, Burns worked at Argus Camera of Ann Arbor for seven years before getting married.

After a break in her career, she returned to work for Bendix Corp. where she was employed for four years. She then sought a job at EMU. She was hired by Dean Earl Roth in 1964.

At EMU, Burns became a part of the College of Business family which for her will be hard to leave.

Dr. Joe Kent Kerby, dean of the college, among others, will miss her. "The things I appreciate most about Stephanie are her total honesty and her great devotion and loyalty to EMU," he said. "She does things that need to be done without prodding. Unknown to many, she was the prime mover

behind the College of Business banquet."

Like a good secretary, she often made suggestions to improve things written by Kerby, some were heeded, some not. "She is a bird dog with those things," he joked.

Burns enjoyed a "family reunion" initiated by Kerby during the summer to help keep the close bond between the business faculty, staff and families.

During her retirement, Burns plans to get "caught up." She will have no time for boredom with bowling, playing bridge, planting a garden, participating in church activities and camping with her large family. "And," she adds, "I can just sit around and loaf."

Burns will undoubtedly enjoy busily "catching up" on some sleep, too.

tion Offices will include an information merger built around the Student Information File, a physical merger of the offices into Pierce Hall, and an administrative merger under the direction of a single new administrator.

The on-line registration system will utilize the Student Information File and will form the foundation from which automatic updating of the file is possible. This, then, will allow for on-line automation of the Academic Records Office operations.

The eventual integration of the new Records/Registration Office will allow for on-line use of the Student Information File by the Academic Services Center staff and by faculty and administrators who are engaged in advising.

Other issues to be considered by the Project Team include the compatibility of the Financial Aid SAM system with the new Student Information File, the compatibility of other student service files, such as Housing, Career Services, etc., the compatibility of various financial and accounting systems with the new file, and the necessity and/or desirability of policy changes related to registration, etc.

The first task of the team will be to review the recommendations made by consultant Ken Bogard, registrar at Miami University. Provost Collins emphasized that "at this point, there is no commitment to accept or implement all of his (Bogard's) recommendations."

### Advice to Faculty Advisors

An article written by Stacy Palmer offers some timely observations and suggestions for faculty members involved with advising. Palmer states that most students have come to view academic advising as a valuable function concerning program choice, graduation requirements, and career decisions. It is especially vital for colleges and universities to have a voice concerning program in an era where the student consumers are so concerned with the positive outcome of their education (a job) and "getting their money's worth." A survey conducted by ACT reveals that poor advising is one of the most cited reasons given by students who drop out or transfer. It was also noted that one of the glaring weaknesses in most advising programs is that few faculty members have any training in counseling and may feel uncomfortable in the advising role.

In her article, Palmer put forth some suggestions offered by advising specialists to faculty members who are involved in advising. A sample includes the following:

1. Help students relax during their first advising session.
2. Stay informed about changes in the curriculum and in academic rules and procedures.
3. Keep up with employment trends.
4. Expect to be asked about personal issues.
5. Avoid stereotyping student's interest and career plans.

These are only a few of the suggestions in the article. See the *Chronicle* article cited below for further information.

At the present time the ASC has an on-going faculty-intern program whereby several faculty members spend a semester learning advising techniques and enhancing their knowledge of other academic programs, basic studies, and University policies and rules.
