EMU BOARD OF REGENTS DISCUSS FUTURE OF FOOTBALL PROGRAM

The EMU Board of Regents held a special meeting Monday, July 30 to discuss the future of football and membership in the Mid-American Conference.

The meeting was necessitated by the vote of the Council of Presidents of the Mid-American Conference Monday, July 16, to expel Eastern from the conference unless it drops football by Aug. 1.

The Regents discussed the two choices available to the University:

1. The University can retain football and maintain a full program of 22 sports but forfeit its eligibility to compete in all Mid-American Conference intercollegiate competition, or
2. The University can immediately drop football for the fall of 1984 and thereby retain its eligibility to compete in all other Mid-American Conference intercollegiate competition.

In addition to the special Regents meeting, an open forum to discuss the future of athletics at Eastern was held Tuesday, July 24 for EMU alumni.

FORMER DIRECTOR
OF COOPERATIVE ED DIES

Dr. Jane Moehle, former director of cooperative education at Eastern Michigan University, died Sunday, July 15 at St. Joseph Mercy Hospital after a lengthy illness.

Moehle, 62, worked at EMU from 1978 until 1983. She held bachelor's degrees and a master's degree from the University of Cincinnati and earned her doctorate at Wayne State University.

Prior to her employment at Eastern Michigan, Moehle worked for the Michigan Department of Education, the Girl Scouts of Metropolitan Detroit and Wayne State University. She also served as associate dean of women at the University of Illinois.

In addition, Moehle worked as director of student affairs at Jewish Hospital School of Nursing in Cincinnati from 1945 to 1948 and as director of residences at Kent State University from 1943 to 1945.

CHILDREN'S CENTER TO RELOCATE

The EMU Children's Center, which has been located in the First Baptist Church for 14 years, will relocate to the Rackham Building by early September.

The Children's Center, also known as the Child Development Laboratory, is operated by the Department of Home Economics. The purpose of the center is to provide comprehensive developmental programs for approximately 100 community-area children each year while offering credit and non-credit opportunities to approximately 350 University students.

The center currently offers half-day programs for three to five year olds. Infants, toddlers and two year olds attend on a semi-regular basis as University courses are scheduled.

The United States Information Agency has announced a program of selective assistance in support of the President's International Youth Exchange Initiative.
