## EMU'S NEW WARNING SYSTEM SIGNALS SEVERE WEATHER

Should the quiet summer campus atmosphere be interrupted by a blast from a wailing siren, its signal should not go unheeded. Severe weather could be on its way.

The severe weather warning system, which was installed on the roof of the Olds Student Recreation Center earlier this year, consists of 12 large loudspeakers, arranged in a circular pattern. It is activated by Eastern's Public Safety Department.

The system was designed to be heard on the main campus, according to Glen Bolling, principal plant engineer. Bolling also indicated that the system was tested and heard at Westview, Cornell Courts and other campus housing units.

"The signal sounds somewhat like a siren, an electronic wailing noise," Bolling said. The siren runs for three minutes and stops automatically. The "all clear" signal repeats with a slightly different sound, Bolling said. In addition to the siren, the system can accommodate loudspeaker announcements after the warning is sounded.

The Public Safety Department routinely receives severe weather warnings from the Washtenaw County Office of Disaster Preparedness. If the warning includes the EMU campus, the siren would be activated, Bolling said.

If the siren is activated, staff and students are advised to seek cover at an indoor, ground level location, preferably away from any windows. The siren would be activated in the case of a tornado warning, which means a tornado or severe storm has been sighted within a three-mile radius of campus.

Bolling said the system is capable of transmitting seven different sounds. Future plans of the University Safety Committee include assigning different sounds to different types of emergencies.

CHILD CARE CENTER OFFERS  
SUMMER SCHOOL AGE PROGRAM

In addition to its preschool program, the EMU Child Care Center, located on the first floor of the Snow Health Center, offers a daytime program for children ages six to 12 summer term from June 25 to August 17.

The program includes open swimming, arts and crafts projects, gym time, nature exploration, sports and science activities.

Summer hours for the center are 7:45 a.m. - 5:15 p.m. Monday through Friday. Children may arrive or depart at any hour between a quarter to and a quarter past the hour. This allows children to be uninterrupted for at least half of each hour.

All children of EMU faculty, staff and students between the ages of two and a half and 12 are eligible to attend.

The cost is \$1.60 per hour for regularly scheduled care and \$2 per hour drop-in care. Also, there is a \$4 registration fee per family per term, and reduced rates for several children in one family.

FULBRIGHT AWARDS OFFERED

Fulbright Scholar Awards competition is under way, with some 800 awards available this year. Usually covering periods of two to 10 months, Fulbright Scholar Awards are available in all academic fields and in a wide range of professions. This year's offerings include some 275 awards for postdoctoral research, about a third of the total. The remainder are for college and university lecturing or for consultative or teaching positions with governmental bodies or other professional institutions.
