## Regents approve executive appointments

The EMU Board of Regents approved three executive level appointments at its May meeting.

Roy Wilbanks, assistant to the president for government and community relations and secretary to the Board of Regents, was named vice president for university relations.

Laurence N. Smith, vice president for student affairs, was named vice president for university marketing and student affairs.

And, John C. Fountain, vice president for university relations who served as interim executive director for inter-collegiate athletics, was appointed executive director of publicity and promotions, contingent upon his acceptance of the position when he returns from an unpaid leave of absence Nov. 1, 1985.

The appointments of Wilbanks and Smith will not require changes in their current salaries or administrative classifications and Fountain's salary and job level will be set prior to his return in November.

## AUPHA recognizes EMU Program

The Health Administration Program here has been awarded full undergraduate membership in the Association of University Programs in Health Administration.

In receiving membership status, the EMU program becomes one of only 18 baccalaureate programs in the United States to hold such a distinction and the only member program in Michigan.

AUPHA membership is granted following a three-year probationary period and a stringent program review, according to Dr. Michael J. Long, director of the Health Administration Program. While AUPHA accredits graduate programs in health administration, full membership is currently awarded to undergraduate programs.

Long credits the program's acceptance to the strength of its faculty and curriculum. "Also, the AUPHA membership committee said EMU's application was one of the best prepared they had seen," he added.

Eastern's health administration curriculum concentrates on the principles and processes used in health administration and management. The program is suited for men and women employed as administrators and as auxiliary personnel in health care institutions.

EMU's Health Administration Program began six years ago with the aid of a federal grant. The program currently enrolls approximately 180 students.

# Regents Summary

The EMU Board of Regents acted on the following agenda items at its May meeting:

—Accepted 18 educational grants totaling \$1,510,069. Of this amount, seven of the grants, totaling \$245,100, went to the Technology Services Center, \$200,000 of which will extend the existing University Chair in Statistical Process Control agreement with Ford Motor Co. through Sept. 30, 1987.

The largest of the new grants was a \$155,308 grant from the United Auto Workers Ford National Development and Training Center, to the College of Education Services Center for a computer literacy pilot project. Directed by Dr. Mary Green, associate dean of the College of Education, the project will provide computer literacy training within the framework of the Reading Academy program now underway at the Ypsilanti Ford Plant.

—Received \$150,000 bequest from the estate of 1925 alumna Thelma McAndless, to establish the Thelma McAndless Distinguished Professor Chair in the College of Arts and Sciences.

—Approved a newly revised Student Conduct Code and Conduct Code for Student Organizations.

—Approved a new communications policy which outlines the format for public participation at its regular and special meetings, in an effort to be more responsive and accessible to the public.

—Approved naming a new bio-fitness laboratory for EMU alumna and emeritus faculty member Ruth Boughner. The laboratory will be constructed in Warner Physical Education Building.

—Granted tenure to 20 faculty members. Faculty members receiving tenure in the College of Arts and Sciences included Dr. Joann Aebersold, assistant professor in the Department of Foreign Languages/Bilingual Studies; Dr. John Cooper, assistant professor of mathematics and computer science; Dr. David Crary, assistant professor of economics; Dr. Dennis Preston, professor of English Language and literature; John W. Prince, professor of music; Dr. Kenneth Rusiniak, assistant professor of psychology; Dr. Bill Woodland, assistant professor of economics; and Patricia Zimmer, assistant professor of communication and theater arts.

Granted tenure in the College of Business was Dr. Mohsen Sharifi-Fardi,

associate professor of accounting and finance.

## Words in the World: A Humanistic Inquiry into Language and Culture

The Michigan Council for the Humanities has issued a Request For Proposal responding to the above theme. The goal of the RFP is to expand and deepen public understanding of the many cultures of the world by supporting projects which are a study of foreign languages to examine the cultural and linguistic milieu of some of the various peoples throughout the world.

Projects responding to this initiative should take one or more of the following approaches toward the subject: (1) an examination of language and its relationship to other areas of culture, with particular emphasis on how these areas are embodied and expressed in language; (2) an exploration of languages which are international in scope and influence; (3) an approach which illustrates the changes and continuities within a language (or languages) and the cultural significance of both; (4) an examination of how ideas are expressed and communicated in a particular cultural context; and (5) an exploration of translation from one language to another or from one medium or genre to another.
