UNIVERSITY ADMINISTRATORS TRAVEL TO LANSING TO PRESENT BUDGET REQUEST

A contingent of University administrators traveled to Lansing Tuesday, Nov. 10, to present the University's 1982-83 state appropriation request of \$39.4 million and four program revision requests totaling \$1.3 million to Gerald H. Miller, director of the Department of Management and Budget.

"It was a very conservative and realistic presentation on our part," John C. Fountain, acting vice president for University Relations, reported.

"President Porter presented our request and then they gave us their gloomy report on the state of Michigan's economy...Not much else significant happened," Fountain said.

EMU's requested state appropriation is a seven percent increase over the current 1982 appropriation of \$36.8 million.

The four new program revisions included in the request are \$174,660 for a computer science program in the Mathematics Department, \$540,692 for a capital investment in instructional equipment, \$101,793 to fund a program for handicapped students, and \$484,000 for major facilities maintenance on campus.

TIAA-CREF REPRESENTATIVES TO CONDUCT RETIREMENT SESSIONS

KENNEDY ASSASSINATION RESEARCHER TO LECTURE AT EMU NOV. 18

Dale K. Myers, a Michigan broadcaster who has conducted an extensive personal study of the assassination of President John F. Kennedy and has obtained documents through the Freedom of Information Act that he says shed new light on the murder of Dallas police officer J. D.
