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STATE COLLEGE PRESIDENTS CONCERNED OVER FINANCIAL CRISIS

Harold T. Shapiro, president of the University of Michigan and chairman of the Presidents Council of State Colleges and Universities, recently released a statement of concern over Michigan's financial crisis.

The following is part of Shapiro's statement:

"Our attention has focused on the growing concern over whether Michigan's system of higher education can continue in its present form, given the continuing series of budgetary shocks caused by reductions in support from the State of Michigan.

"In the last two years, state support, adjusted for inflation, has dropped sharply. We recognize the difficult situation facing the State of Michigan, but it is our obligation to point out that Michigan's public higher education system may be approaching a final crisis. Without improved budgetary support for higher education, our capacity to serve Michigan's citizens and to lay the foundation for the state's future growth is in jeopardy.

"Colleges and universities safeguard important values of teaching, of research, of service to society. These values have helped the people of our state in both good times and bad. As a group we are committed to assisting the State of Michigan, but we cannot continue to do so effectively while state funding continues to be eroded. In the last two years, we have been forced to curtail many services. Further budget cuts will result in the dismantling of basic components of the system. A structure which took over a century to build is, in some cases, moving toward a struggle for real survival."

Shapiro said that further reductions in support for higher education will result in higher student costs, restricted access to education offerings, reduced research support, and damage to the ability of colleges and universities to help the state in its economic recovery.
