The regular monthly meeting of the Board will follow the meeting of the whole at 11 a.m. Both meetings are open to the public.

LT. GOVERNOR BRICKLEY TO SPEAK JUNE 16 AS PART OF LECTURE SERIES

Lieutenant Governor James Brickley will discuss "A Model for High Technology: The Government Perspective," Wednesday, June 16 at the Sheraton University Inn in Ann Arbor at 8 p.m.

The Lt. Governor's lecture is the last in the "High Technology and the Changing Work Life" series sponsored by the Michigan Technology Council and the College of Technology.

Brickley is expected to discuss Michigan's changing economic landscape, the state's traditional dependence on the auto industry and the government's role in the conversion to high technology industries.

The lecture is free and open to the public.

Dr. Wayne Weeks, assistant professor in the Department of Accounting and Finance, has been elected to the executive board of the Association of Michigan Collegiate Faculties.

AMCF is an organization of state supported baccalaureate colleges and universities in Michigan. Its assembly is comprised of two faculty representatives from each school and it serves as a clearinghouse for the exchange of information and as a liaison between faculty and the Michigan legislature on questions of public higher education. AMCF also provides for research, study and investigation of issues pertaining to higher education.

Weeks is one of seven members of the executive board of the association.

SEVEN FEMALE FACULTY RECEIVE KEAL AWARDS

Seven female faculty members have been selected as recipients of the Josephine Nevins Keal Endowment Awards for the winter term of 1982.

The awards, made twice each year at EMU, are awarded to female faculty members in the name of Keal, a 1901 graduate of the University. Funds from Keal's \$50,000 endowment have been earmarked for use by the University "to augment the income of female faculty members and to assist them in advancing their professional competence and rank through study and research."

The seven winter recipients include: Betty L. Barber, an assistant professor of home economics; Norma L. Beauchamp, an assistant professor of occupational therapy; Deborah L. DeLaski-Smith, an instructor of home economics; Ronda Glikin, assistant humanities librarian in the Center of Educational Resources; Katherine Strand Holkeboer, associate professor of speech and dramatic arts; Dr. Karen E. Lindenberg, associate professor of political science; and Mary F. McCarthy, associate professor of economics.
