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BOARD OF REGENTS APPROVES 1982-83 BUDGET

A 1982-83 General Fund Budget totaling \$55,352,002 was approved by the Board of Regents at its regular monthly meeting June 16.

The proposed budget represents an increase of \$1,177,567, or 2.2 percent, from the 1981-82 revised General Fund Budget. Incorporated in the budget is an estimated state appropriation of \$32,849,889. EMU planners note the expected state appropriation will be less than the 1979-80 appropriation for the third consecutive year.

The 1982-83 General Fund Budget is based on an enrollment of 14,055 full-year-equated students with 417,500 student credit hours taken. Expected revenue from student tuition and fees is \$20,563,307.

The budget includes a \$50,000 transfer from the auxiliary activities of the Health Service Operations as a reimbursement for previous support from the General Fund. The Health Service at EMU is one of the activities supported by the Auxiliary Fund.

Other highlights of the 1982-83 General Fund Budget include:

- A reduction of projected investment income applied to the General Fund. The reduction brings total investment income to \$400,000.

- No wage or salary increases proposed until June 1983 and a plan which would index wages and salaries to state appropriated revenue. (The proposal will be negotiated with employee bargaining groups.)

- An instructional faculty of 719 full-time-equated faculty, unchanged from 1981-82.

- A 2.5 position reduction in staff. The staff reduction, however, includes the addition of 11 new positions for the new Intramural/Recreational Facility.

- An increase in student wages of approximately \$191,017 for 25.7 new student employee positions.

- A \$3.1 million budget for utilities, approximately 5.6 percent of the total planned expenditures during 1982-83.

- Limited budget adjustments for price increases.

- A 25 percent increase in funds provided

for the Recognition of Excellence Scholarship Program.

- Additional funding to promote the growth of the College of Technology.

- Funding for a foreign student advisor to counsel EMU's increased foreign student population.

- Funding for expansion of the intramural program and provisions for custodial and maintenance services for the new facility.

- A reduction of \$125,000 in General Fund support to intercollegiate athletics, the first phase of a five-year plan to reduce support to the program.

- Reductions in maintenance and service costs for buildings on campus through the closing of Welch Hall and two converted residences on Forest Ave.

- Provisions for reinstating a parking fee for employees.

- And a provision for continuing a \$25,000 matching grant challenge with radio station WEMU-FM.

REGENTS APPROVE TENURE FOR 13 FACULTY MEMBERS

The Board of Regents granted tenure to 13 faculty members at its regular monthly meeting June 16.

The two faculty members in the College of Arts and Sciences granted tenure were Michael Vogt, assistant professor of economics and Russell Reed, associate professor of music.

Those granted tenure in the College of Business included Clifford Weeks, assistant professor of accounting and finance; Gregory Huszczo, assistant professor of management and Charles Saxon, assistant professor of operations research and information systems.

Approved for tenure in the College of Education were Linda Hemmelgarn, instructor of health, physical education, recreation and dance; Roberta Anderson, assistant professor of special education and Gayle Nash, assistant professor of special education.

Four faculty members in the College of Health and Human Services were granted tenure. They included Kaaren Brown, assistant professor of social work; Donna Eyster,

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assistant professor of nursing education and Sherry Folks-Sayles, an assistant professor of occupational therapy.

And approved for tenure in the Center of Educational Resources (Library) was Margaret Best, Instructional Materials Center librarian.

The granting of tenure is effective with the beginning of the fall semester 1982.

**INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETICS
REORGANIZED**

A reorganization of the Department of Intercollegiate Athletics was approved by the Board of Regents at its regular monthly meeting June 16.

The changes, announced by Acting Vice President for University Relations John C. Fountain, included:

--The promotion of Paul A. Shoults, associate director of intercollegiate athletics, to director of intercollegiate athletics replacing Alex A. Agase who left the University June 5.

--The promotion of EMU Head Baseball Coach Ronald E. Oestrike to associate athletic director. Oestrike will continue to coach the varsity baseball team.

--The initiation of a national search to fill the new position of assistant athletic director to administer men's non-revenue sports (wrestling, golf, gymnastics and tennis).

--The approval of the position of coordinator of athletic promotions and the initiation of a regional search for an individual to fill that post. The promotions coordinator will be responsible for student ticket sales, the cheerleading, pompon and pep squads.

--And the allocation of \$4,000 in the department's budget to fund a graduate assistant for the baseball program.

The administrative realignment will provide a cost savings of \$4,640 to the University.

The changes are effective July 1.

**EIGHT EDUCATIONAL GRANTS
ACCEPTED BY REGENTS**

Eight educational grants totaling \$738,604 were accepted by the Board of Regents at its regular monthly meeting June 16.

The largest of the grants was a \$600,000 continuing grant from the U.S. Agency for International Development for the continuation of the "Swaziland Primary Curriculum Development" project.

A \$126,363 grant from the U.S. Department of Education will fund EMU's Bilingual Education Training Project, which is aimed at meeting Michigan's need for more adequately prepared bilingual bicultural teachers.

Other educational grants accepted by the Regents include:

--A \$7,500 grant from the Society of Manufacturing Engineers Education Foundation.

--A \$2,000 grant from the Michigan Department of Education for a Center of Comprehensive Arts.

--A \$1,956 grant from the Michigan Council for the Humanities.

--A \$500 grant from the Detroit Edison Company, and a \$200 grant from the Bechtel Power Corporation, which funded the recent series of public lectures on "High Technology and the Changing Work Life."

--An \$85 grant from the Wayne County Health Department to fund a workshop titled "Tips on Child Management."

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
